Food Insecurity in Nevada

- Feeding America ranks Nevada 8th (15.2%) nationally among states with the highest projected overall food insecurity rates (2021)
 - Ranked 8th for projected very low food security rates nationally
- Nevada's 3rd Congressional District is one of the areas with the highest national projected food insecurity rates (+36,970) as well as highest projected very low food security rates (+17,430)(2021).



Childhood Food Insecurity



- Nevada ranks 5th (23%) for states with **highest projected child food insecurity rates** in 2021.
 - Louisiana 26%
 - Hawaii 24.6%
 - New Mexico 23.7%
 - Texas 23.6%
- For states with project **very low food security rates** in children, Nevada ranks **2**nd (8.1%) just below Oklahoma (8.4%)

 - Children up to age 5

SNAP Emergency Allotment (SEA)



- Starting April 1st participants saw a decrease on their SNAP benefits
 - Decrease of \$43,000,000 per month in Nevada alone

SNAP Emergency Allotment (SEA)



- What does SEA look like for the average person, family, senior?
 - 31,940 single-parent SNAP households average monthly loss is \$152.51
 - 47,918 one-person households where the member is 60 years or older average monthly loss in SNAP benefits is \$131.86.
 - 11,444 two-person households where both members are 60 years or older average monthly loss is \$230.49
 - Seniors who receive unearned wages (RDSI/SSI) will see a decrease from \$281 per month to \$23 per month



Impacts of Childhood Insecurity - SEA



- Disproportionate impact on racial and ethnic minorities, senior citizens, households with children and people with chronic diseases.
- Programs will have to pivot quickly and enhance programming to adjust to the increased need.
 - Inflation is already making it harder for partners to purchase enough foods
- WIC anticipates an increase in participation as a result
 - WIC is maintaining increase in cash value benefits for fruits and vegetables
 - \$25 for child participants / month
 - \$44 for pregnant and postpartum participants / month
 - \$49 for exclusively breastfeeding participants / month
 - WIC program barriers still exist, such as:
 - Needed WIC technology advancements
 - Requirements to become certified
 - Maintain appointment schedule and nutrition education requirements
 - Still perceived as a "formula program" in the wake of formula recall



Implications of Child Food Insecurity



- Birth complications
 - Low birth weight
 - Poor maternal outcomes
 - Iron deficiencies
- Development
 - Stunted growth
 - Anemia and asthma
 - Oral health problems
 - Mental disorders
 - Lower cognitive level

- Overall Implications
 - Negative health outcomes
 - Lower-quality diets (nutrition insecurity)
 - Higher health care costs
 - Higher obesity rates



Current Efforts



- 2023 Food security strategic plan ready for release February 2023.
 - More emphasis on collaboration across the food security ecosystem, non-typical food security partners, and those with lived experience.
- WIC and SNAP are working together to streamline referrals.
- WIC online ordering grant expand shopping options for WIC participants to make shopping easier and reduce fear of stigma in stores.
- WIC is supporting multiple local organizations apply for an upcoming WIC innovation and outreach grant.
