



## Music & Memory Update – March 4, 2018

There are currently 14 facilities participating in the Nevada Music & Memory Initiative. Facilities are asked to complete a Quarterly Resident Assessment on each of their program participants and submit completed assessments to the Perry Foundation. Response are on a 1 - 10 scale with 1 indicating 'low response' and 10 indicating 'high response'. The following is a summary of the cumulative average for all assessments received.

\*\*Although a reduction in the use of anti-psychotic medications was self-reported, the participating facilities have an aggregate increase of 1%. The largest reduction was 5.5% and the greatest increase was 8.4%. (Casper Data) It is important to note that the facilities with the greatest increase have also had turnover at key leadership positions during this time period.

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
