## **NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING**

Intent to Adopt Regulations (LCB File No. R112-16)

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the State Board of Health will hold a public hearing to consider amendments to Chapter 444 of Nevada Administrative Code (NAC), Sanitation. This public hearing is to be held in conjunction with the State Board of Health meeting on September 8, 2017.

The State Board of Health will be conducted via videoconference beginning at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, September 8, 2017 at the following locations:

The proposed changes to NAC 444 include the following:

- 1. Adopting regulation amendments for Tattoos, piercings, and other forms of Invasive Body Decoration procedures that are not currently regulated state-wide in a manner that protects the health of the consumer in the State of Nevada.
- 2. There is a high risk of contracting skin infections, bloodborne diseases, and other communicable diseases during procedures performed in unregulated and potentially insanitary establishments. The regulation changes propose inspection oversight of invasive body decoration procedures, with the intent to reduce the risk of bloodborne disease and skin infection among patrons and operators by enforcing industry best practices in all establishments within the State.
- 3. These regulation amendments require all operators in the State to pay a permit fee and become subject to inspection by the Health Authority having jurisdiction. Regulated establishments will be assessed an annual permit fee of \$290; fees assessed by operators at special events will be variable depending on the number of events attended per year.
- 1. Anticipated effects on the business which amendments to NAC 444 will regulate:
  - A. *Adverse effects*: It is not expected that these regulations will have significant adverse impact upon small businesses operating from brick-and-mortar establishments.

    Traveling mobile establishments may be impacted by these regulations due to

- restrictions on the number of days a mobile unit can operate from a single location. Additional permits can be obtained if the 14 day maximum needs to be exceeded.
- B. *Beneficial:* Proper oversight of the industry will result in better protection of the public health and improved business operations by reducing the number diseases that may be contracted through the Invasive Body Decoration procedures. The benefit to the time restriction on the traveling mobile permits is to ensure that the public safety is preserved. Mobile operations would have to notify the health authority of the event location and timeframe ahead of time to allow for guidance to be provided in advance and onsite inspections to occur during the event.
- C. *Immediate*: Existing establishments will have to submit an annual permit fee of \$290 to obtain a permit; fees assessed by operators at special events will be variable depending on the number of events attended per year.
- D. *Long-term:* Annual permit fees; costs associated with compliance schedules established with the facility operator(s) and the health authority to ensure compliance with the amendments to NAC 444.

## 2. Anticipated effects on the public:

A. Adverse: None.

B. *Beneficial:* Improved public health protection through proper industry oversight, reduced infections, and prevention of disease transmission from Tattoo, Piercing, and other forms of Invasive Body Decoration procedures that are provided to consumers in Nevada.

C. *Immediate*: Prevention of Illness and Disease.

D. Long-term: Same as above

3. The estimated cost to the Division of Public and Behavioral Health for enforcement of the proposed regulations is to be covered by the proposed fee to license Invasive Body Decoration Establishments in the proposed regulations.

The proposed regulations do not overlap or duplicate any other Nevada state regulations. Federal regulations do not have any requirements for an Invasive Body Decoration Facility. The proposed regulations create needed oversight for the industry, and at the same time the expanded protection of public health will result in fewer skin infections by consumers in Nevada.

Members of the public may make oral comments at this meeting. Persons wishing to submit written testimony or documentary evidence in excess of two typed, 8-1/2" x 11" pages must submit the material to the Board's Secretary to be received no later than August 18, 2017 at the following address:
