I am a Nevada resident of almost 20 years and a registered voter.

I am a parent to five (5) children who have either previously attended, currently attend, or in the future, may attend colleges in our home State.

I am strongly opposed to the idea that current and future students of UNLV, UNR, and CSN would have to inject themselves with a non-FDA-approved pharmaceutical drug, or possibly be denied enrollment.

Please consider, how forced mandates eradicate freedom. Health freedom, medical freedom, religious freedom, and the ability for a competent person of sound-mind, to be able to choose what medical procedure they wish to participate in.

Students with medical conditions, unable to receive the vaccine, and those who practice religions which prohibit them from taking it, should not be discriminated against, denied an opportunity to enroll, or apply for graduation.
