My name is Kylie Kibala and I am an incoming freshman to UNR this fall. I have many concerns regarding the potential requirement of the Covid-19 vaccine to attend UNR. I am adamantly against the requirement of the Covid-19 experimental vaccination to attend the university I have dreamed of attending since I was 11 and have rightly earned.

The Covid-19 vaccine is an experimental, non-FDA approved vaccine that we the people have yet to see the side effects of. My biggest concerns are: that the vaccine could risk female fertility rates and increase miscarriages due to the simple fact that this vaccine has not been approved by the FDA's standards.
