RE: Permission to Develop Regulations to create provisions governing the approval, application, expenditure, and withdrawal of financial support or refusal to approve a grant in cases of violation of processes for the Diapering Resources Account of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health.

The proposed regulations create provisions to add Chapter 422A to the Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) to detail the process by which the Division of Public and Behavioral Health (DPBH) Administrator or their designee will approve and administer grants made pursuant to Nevada Revised Statutes 422A.660 from the Diapering Resources Account of the DPBH. The proposed regulations indicate the Board of Health's role in determining what information a grant recipient from the Account must submit and details the Administrator or their designee will approve grants in accordance with grant guidelines and requires a public review process should the Division make substantive changes to grant guidelines. Application processes and provision of grant guidelines must be available a minimum of three months before a deadline for filing an application and the proposed regulations state late applications will not be reviewed as well as provide a website location for the grant guidelines. The proposed regulations also specify the Division's role in review, panel selection, panel review scope, and limits the Division's ability to make substantive changes to a panel review process without public review before a change is made and specifies where such a proposed change would be posted. Final selection and award amount are proposed to be made by the Administrator or their designee after reviewing the recommendations of the panel. Compliance with all requirements of the Division grants management packet are required and any substantive changes to the packet require a period of public review and comment and the regulations specify a website posting location. Final report requirements for grantees, and associated penalties for non-compliance, are detailed, as well as required grantee notifications related to specific changes, termination or reduction of award process, and record retention requirements are detailed. Violation or avoidance of required compliance with the proposed regulations are stated, and standard severability language is included as part of new NAC chapter development.

The Maternal, Child and Adolescent Health Section of the Bureau of Child, Family and Community Wellness is requesting approval to move forward with the regulations developed which the Diapering Resource Committee have approved to move forward after review.

The cost to the Division will be the Legislative Counsel Bureau cost of regulation development, funded through the Title V Maternal and Child Health Block Grant.

EXPLANATION - Matter in *italics* is new; matter in brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AUTHORITY: §§1-9, NRS 422A.675 and 439.200.

A REGULATION relating to child care; prescribing the procedure to apply for a grant of money from the Diapering Resources Account; requiring a grantee to enter into an operating agreement with the Division of Public and Behavioral Health of the Department of Health and Human Services and to submit certain reports; prescribing the procedure for a grantee to draw money from a grant; authorizing the Administrator of the Division to take certain actions upon a determination that a grantee no longer needs a grant or a portion thereof or is using grant money for an unauthorized purpose; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law: (1) establishes the Diapering Resources Account in the State General Fund; (2) requires the Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health of the Department of Health and Human Services to administer the Account; and (3) requires the money used in the Account to be expended to provide diapers and diapering supplies to recipients of public assistance and other low-income families in this State. Existing law requires the State Board of Health to adopt regulations prescribing the criteria for determining whether a person qualifies for assistance from the Account and the procedure for distributing money from the Account. (NRS 422A.675) Section 5 of this regulation prescribes the manner in which to apply for a grant of money from the Account and the procedure for the Division to approve or deny such applications. Section 5 also prohibits a grantee from using a grant for a purpose not authorized by law. If an application is approved, section 6 of this regulation requires the grantee to enter into an operating agreement with the Division. Section 7 of this regulation requires a grantee to submit a quarterly report to the Division concerning the success of the project funded by the grant and expected future expenditures of grant money. Section 8 of this regulation prescribes the procedure for a grantee to draw money from a grant. Section 9 of this regulation authorizes the Administrator to take certain action if the Division determines that a grantee: (1) no longer needs a grant or any portion thereof; or (2) is using a grant for an unauthorized purpose.

- **Section 1.** Chapter 422A of NAC is hereby amended by adding thereto the provisions set forth as sections 2 to 9, inclusive, of this regulation.
- Sec. 2. As used in sections 2 to 9, inclusive, of this regulation, unless the context otherwise requires, the words and terms defined in sections 3 and 4 of this regulation have the meanings ascribed to them in those sections.
 - Sec. 3. "Account" means the Diapering Resources Account created by NRS 422A.675.
- Sec. 4. "Operating agreement" means an agreement entered into pursuant to section 6 of this regulation between the Division of Public and Behavioral Health and a person or entity approved by the Division of Public and Behavioral Health to receive a grant from the Account.
- Sec. 5. 1. To receive a grant of money from the Account, a person or entity must apply to the Division of Public and Behavioral Health in the form prescribed by the Division of Public and Behavioral Health. The application must include, without limitation:
- (a) The manner in which the person or entity proposes to use the grant, including, without limitation, itemized estimates of the costs of the goods and services for which the person or entity proposes to use the grant;
- (b) A commitment to enter into an operating agreement if the application is approved and proposed terms for the operating agreement; and
 - (c) The amount of the grant for which the applicant is applying.
- 2. The Division of Public and Behavioral Health shall determine in a public meeting whether to approve or deny an application based on the ability of the applicant to provide diapers and diapering resources to recipients of public assistance and other low-income families in this State.

- 3. A grant of money from the Account must be used for a purpose authorized by NRS 422A.675. A grantee shall not use the grant for any other purpose.
- Sec. 6. 1. If the Division of Public and Behavioral Health approves an application for a grant of money from the Account pursuant to section 5 of this regulation, the grantee must enter into an operating agreement with the Division of Public and Behavioral Health that specifies:
 - (a) The amount of the grant;
 - (b) The manner in which the money must be used;
 - (c) The date on which the application was approved;
- (d) The indicators of performance that the Division of Public and Behavioral Health and the grantee will use to measure the success of the program funded by the grant;
 - (e) That the grantee must submit the report described in section 7 of this regulation;
- (f) That the Division of Public and Behavioral Health or a designee thereof may review any document under the control of the grantee if the Division of Public and Behavioral Health or the designee determines the review to be necessary to provide financial oversight of the project; and
 - (g) The date on which the grant expires.
- 2. The Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health must review and approve an operating agreement before the Division of Public and Behavioral Health may enter into the operating agreement.
- Sec. 7. The recipient of a grant of money from the Account shall submit to the Division of Public and Behavioral Health a quarterly report which includes, without limitation:

- 1. An evaluation of the success of the project funded by the grant using each indicator of performance specified in the operating agreement;
- 2. Projected estimates of the costs involved in the project funded by the grant for the immediately following quarter and the duration of the grant; and
- 3. The dates on which the grantee expects to draw money from the grant for the duration of the grant and the amount of money that the grantee expects to draw on each date.
- Sec. 8. 1. To draw money from a grant from the Account, a grantee must submit a request to the Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health in the form prescribed by the Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health. The request must include, without limitation:
 - (a) The amount of money that the grantee is requesting to withdraw; and
- (b) Evidence that the grantee is meeting the indicators of performance prescribed in the operating agreement.
- 2. After receiving a request pursuant to subsection 1, the Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health shall approve or deny the request. The Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health must approve a request if the Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health determines that the grantee is in compliance with the operating agreement.
- 3. If the Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health approves a request, the Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health must cause a check to be issued to the grantee in the amount requested by the grantee.
- 4. If the Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health denies a request, the Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health must provide to the grantee

a statement of the reasons for the denial and the actions that the grantee must take to receive approval.

- Sec. 9. 1. If the Division of Public and Behavioral Health determines that a grantee no longer needs a grant of money from the Account or any portion thereof, the Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health may:
 - (a) Cease making further disbursements from the grant;
 - (b) Require the grantee to repay any unused portion of the grant; or
 - (c) Take both of the actions described in paragraphs (a) and (b).
- 2. If the Division of Public and Behavioral Health determines that a grantee is using the grant for purposes other than those specified in the operating agreement, the Administrator of the Division of Public and Behavioral Health:
 - (a) Must cease making further disbursements from the grant;
 - (b) May determine that the operating agreement is void; and
 - (c) May require the grantee to repay all or any portion of the grant.

The proposed creation of NAC Chapter 422A includes the following:

- The value of the regulation is in detailing processes by which the Division of Public and Behavioral Health (DPBH) Administrator or their designee will approve and administer grants made pursuant to Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 422A.660 from the Diapering Resources Account of the DPBH.
- The benefit of the regulation is in creating a means by which awards from the Diapering Resources Account of the DPBH can be granted and administered.
- 1. Anticipated effects on the business which NAC 422A regulates:

A. Adverse effects: There are no adverse/negative effects to businesses in the State of Nevada.

- B. *Beneficial:* Positive/beneficial effects to businesses in the State of Nevada include support for basic necessities of the families of employees and families in the communities they serve.
- C. *Immediate*: As soon as the proposed regulations become effective it would allow for the ability to make and administer awards from the Diapering Resources Account of the DPBH to grantees serving low income individuals in the community and workforce for businesses in the State of Nevada.
- D. *Long-term*: Long-term positive/beneficial effects to businesses in the State of Nevada include strengthening pathways to support low-income families, benefitting the community as a whole in providing key resources.
- 2. Anticipated effects on the public:
 - A. Adverse: No adverse/negative effects are anticipated to the public in the State of Nevada.
 - B. *Beneficial:* Positive/beneficial effects to the public in the State of Nevada include a means to access essential resources for families through grants made from the Diapering Resources Account to those who struggle to afford diapers to ensure the safe and sanitary environments for their children.
 - C. *Immediate*: As soon as the proposed regulations become effective it would allow for grants to be made from the Diapering Resources Account to grantees serving families of the public in the State of Nevada, as funds are available.
 - D. *Long-term*: Long-term positive/beneficial effects to the public in the State of Nevada are allowing for grants to be made from the Diapering Resources Account to grantees serving families of the State of Nevada and provision of diapering resources at no costs, as funds are available.
- 3. There is no estimated cost to the Division of Public and Behavioral Health for enforcement of the proposed regulations. There are no fees currently set in regulations to be used to cover costs to enforce the proposed regulations.

The proposed regulations do not overlap or duplicate any other Nevada state regulations.

SMALL BUSINESS IMPACT STATEMENT

PROPOSED CREATION OF NEVADA ADMINISTRATIVE CODE CHAPTER 422A: Diapering Account LCB File No. R086-20P

The Division of Public and Behavioral Health (DPBH) has determined that the proposed amendment LCB File No. R086-20P should not have an impact upon a small business or a negative impact on the formation, operation or expansion of a small business in Nevada.

A small business is defined in Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) Chapter 233B as a "business conducted for profit which employs fewer than 150 full-time or part-time employees."

This small business impact statement is made pursuant to NRS 233B.0608 (3) and complies with the requirements of NRS 233B.0609. As required by NRS 233B.0608(3), this statement identifies the methods used by the agency in determining the impact of the proposed regulation on a small business in sections 1, 2, 3, and 4 below and provides the reasons for the conclusions of the agency in section 8 below followed by the certification by the person responsible for the agency.

Background

The proposed regulation details processes by which the Division of Public and Behavioral Health (DPBH) Administrator or their designee will approve and administer grants made pursuant to Nevada Revised Statutes 422A.660 from the Diapering Resources Account of the DPBH.

1) A description of the manner in which comment was solicited from affected small businesses, a summary of their response and an explanation of the manner in which other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

Pursuant to NRS 233B.0608 (2)(a), the Division of Public and Behavioral Health has requested input via posting on the Division website and mailed copies of the proposed regulation and the small business impact statement.

A Small Business Impact Questionnaire was sent to professional diapering resources agencies statewide along with a copy of the proposed regulation changes, on September 28, 2021. The questions on the questionnaire were:

- 1) How many employees are currently employed by your business?
- 2) Will a specific regulation have an adverse economic effect upon your business?

- 3) Will the regulation(s) have any beneficial effect upon your business?
- 4) Do you anticipate any indirect adverse effects upon your business?
- 5) Do you anticipate any indirect beneficial effects upon your business?

1) Describe the manner in which the analysis was conducted.

The Division of Public and Behavioral Health considered possible small business impacts of the proposed regulation and presented the draft regulation to the Diapering Resources Committee for their consideration and feedback on the proposed regulation as subject matter experts. The proposed regulation allows the Division to operationalize Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 422A.675. Responses to the Small Business Impact Questionnaire were summarized above and reflect no negative impacts and highlight positive impacts on small businesses.

2) The estimated economic effect of the proposed regulation on the small business which it is to regulate including, without limitation both adverse and beneficial effects and both direct and indirect effects.

There is no estimated economic effect of the proposed regulation on small businesses.

3) Provide a description of the methods that the agency considered to reduce the impact of the proposed regulation on small businesses and a statement regarding whether the agency actually used any of those methods.

The Division of Public and Behavioral Health has held several opportunities for small businesses to provide input and comments regarding the proposed regulations, including the economic impact the proposed regulations may have on small businesses. The Small Business Impact Questionnaire was posted on the Division website and mailed to professional diapering resource entities in addition to being shared at the Diapering Resources Committee. Workshops will be held on January 11, 2022, allowing for further input by interested parties regarding the proposed regulations and how they will impact small businesses. These comments will be taken into consideration for possible further revisions to the regulations to reduce the economic impact on facilities.

4) The estimated cost to the agency for enforcement of the proposed regulation.

There is no cost to the agency for enforcement of the proposed regulation.

6) If the proposed regulation provides a new fee or increases an existing fee, the total annual amount DPBH expects to collect and the manner in which the money will be used.

The proposed regulation does not provide a new fee or increase an existing fee.

7) An explanation of why any duplicative or more stringent provisions than federal, state or local standards regulating the same activity are necessary.

There are no duplicative or more stringent provisions than federal, state or local standards regulating the same activity.

8) Provide a summary of the reasons for the conclusions of the agency regarding the impact of a regulation on small businesses.

Pending any feedback from the public workshop on January 11, 2022, the responses noted above in Summary of Response to the Small Business Impact Questionnaire mailed and posted on the Division website on September 28, 2021, as well as from the Diapering Resource Committee, align with Division of Public and Behavioral Health determination of no impact to small businesses in Nevada from the proposed regulation. The Division's conclusion regarding impact to small business is based on feedback provided by subject matter experts. The conclusion is that the proposed regulations would have no negative impact, and that there is a potential for a positive impact as a result of cost savings and access to needed service for those who would otherwise have difficulty securing diapering resources.
