SB69 -

Peer Recovery Certification

What does SB69 do?

There are provisions in the bill which outline the requirement for peer recovery support specialists and supervisors to become state certified. Requiring certification does not create any substantial barriers for Peer Support Specialists, and provides public protection and quality care. It requires a demonstration of competence and proves the Peer Recovery Support Specialist is well trained, educated, and skilled in providing appropriate services.. Some benefits include:


