







## Needs - Barriers and Gaps (2022-2023)

- Scarcity of behavioral health clinical services/providers
- Lack of behavioral health workforce across region including retention
- Lack of BH supportive housing/residential services/treatment.
- Long waits for evaluations and intensive residential care access
- Need to travel long distances for specialized and intensive care
- Transportation to access medical care
- Mental health crisis transport
- Homelessness and affordable housing
- Scarcity of dental and primary care and mobile clinics

## Additional Opportunities

- Local Supports for guardianship process
- Examine need for prevention, educational programs, youth development, and school-based programs
- ▶ Need for increased education stigma & harm reduction
- Need for increased parental engagement
- Limited foster care and licensed daycare
- Limited funding and resources in some areas
- Training including crisis planning and support

## Priority Recommendations and Strategies

- Networking and building relationships and working with NRHP, board, hospitals, and local/regional/state/tribal stakeholders.
- More data and resource review and collection to support reporting.
- Ongoing review of strengths, needs, opportunities, barriers, and gaps.
- Strategies, priorities, and recommendations on neighborhood-based empowerment models using action planning and collaborative systems.
- Work to support behavioral health task groups in the region.
- Increased focus on training and support for the behavioral health coordination and workforce in the southern region.
- Support and advocacy for increased funding, resources, staffing, and technical assistance for the southern region.
