988 Implementation Plan Project February 2023



- **SB390:** The Nevada Board of Health authorized a temporary regulation that implements a 35-cent surcharge on phone bills to help fund the Crisis Response System. The temporary authorization will last until November 1st, with more permanent regulations set to be approved by that time.
- **RFI/RFP:** The CRS team is currently reviewing the first draft of the Request for Information (RFI) and anticipate release in Spring 2023. The RFI has been designed to inform the Request for Proposal (RFP), with a greater understanding of the State's needs and line-item quotes to get us there. The bureau expects to release the RFP in Summer 2023 for Nevada's Behavioral Health Crisis Care Hub.
- Virtual Crisis Care: The Eureka County Sheriff's Office is the next agency to go live with Virtual Crisis Care, happening this month. The Elko County Sheriff's Office is slated to begin their VCC training and subsequent golive in the near future.
- **Crisis Stabilization Centers:** The bureau is working toward finalizing the subaward to open the CSC in Northern Nevada in partnership with Renown.
- the Consolidated Appropriation Act of 2023. That means eligibility renewals will start in April. Medicaid is asking everyone to reach out to members, employees, and the public using the resources available in this toolkit to help as many people stay insured through the transition. To get the word out, consider forwarding the following message to your contacts: Nevada Medicaid is asking for our help to keep Nevadans insured as the Covid-19 Public Health Emergency winds down. Members need to ensure their addresses are up to date online, and completing and returning any renewal packets or request for information from the Division of Welfare and Supportive Services. Notice of Funding Opportunities

- **Grants addressing Substance Use Disorder Treatment:** Five grant programs are <u>available</u> and are aimed at preventing substance misuse and treating substance use disorder (SUD) throughout the nation. The grant opportunities total about \$73.4 million.
- Sober Truth on Preventing Underage Drinking Act Grants: The purpose of this program is to prevent and reduce alcohol use among youth and young adults ages 12-20 in communities throughout the US. <u>Applications</u> due Friday, March 3, 2023.

 Community Programs for Outreach and Intervention with Youth and Young Adults at Clinical High Risk for Psychosis: The purpose of this program is to provide trauma-informed, evidence-based interventions to youth and young adults (not more than 25 years of age) who are at clinical high risk for psychosis. <u>Applications</u> due March 14, 2023.

ICYMI

- Improved FindTreatment.gov is live: <u>FindTreatment.gov</u> has been updated to be a better resource for those seeking treatment for mental and substance use disorders.
- HHS Awards Nearly \$245M: The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has awarded nearly \$245 million in Bipartisan Safer Communities Act funding – \$185.7 million from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) and nearly \$60 million from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) – to support youth mental health, help the health care workforce address mental health needs, and fund other critical mental health supports.
- 2022 U.S. National Survey on LGBTQ Youth Mental Health: The Trevor Project has released their 2022 national survey, and some key takeaways for Nevada include: 44% of LGBTQ youth in NV seriously considered suicide in the past year; 75% of LGBTQ youth in NV reported experiencing symptoms of anxiety and 57% experienced symptoms of depression. - Expansion of Access to Medication for Opioid Use Disorder: SAMHSA is acknowledging provisions included in the 2023 Consolidated Appropriations Act that will significantly expand access to medication for opioid use disorder. You can <u>read more</u> about the removal of a federal requirement online.
