Nikki CHW, Resource Hub CCNN (Catholic Charities of Northern Nevada)

"A single mother contacted me about rental and utility assistance. Her boyfriend had recently abandoned her and their special needs baby. He took the only vehicle they had and cleared out their joint bank account. I conducted a home visit to provide an assessment of her needs in addition to rental and utility assistance. The Resource Hub covered her rental payments up to date and three more months. Also, we connected her with our Thriving Families home delivery program and local agencies such as the Children's Cabinet and Nevada Early Intervention Services."
