Statutory Mandate: Nevada Constitution, Article 4, Section 38. Use of plant of genus Cannabis for medical purposes.

Program Description. The Nevada Marijuana Health Registry is a state registry program within the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health. The role of the program is to administer the provisions of the Medical Use of Marijuana law as approved by the Nevada Legislature and adopted in 2001. Individuals can apply for the registry and, if found eligible, are approved for issuance of an identification card. Eligibility is determined through physician certification of a qualifying medical condition, acceptable criminal background check and Nevada residency.
